

# WEBSITE ACCESSIBILITY CHECKLIST

Making your website accessible doesn't have to be overwhelming. Use this checklist to make sure your site works for everyone, including people with disabilities.



To help you ensure an accessible website we've created this handy checklist to work through.

## Media Accessibility

Complete

Add ALT text to all your images. [Learn how to write ALT text here.](#)

Include captions or transcripts for videos.

Make sure animations and interactive features can be paused, stopped, or hidden if needed.

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## Navigation

Complete

Make your site keyboard-friendly so people can get around without a mouse.

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Add a "skip navigation" link so users can jump straight to the main content.

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Avoid time-sensitive features - or give users the option to extend or turn them off.

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## Forms and Feedback

Complete

Design forms with clear labels and instructions so they're simple to use.

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Write helpful error messages, like "Oops! Please enter a valid email address," so users know what went wrong.

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## Content Design

Complete

Choose fonts that are easy to read, with clear, distinct characters, simple shapes, and consistent sizing to ensure accessibility. [Explore our top 10 fonts for accessibility here.](#)

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Ensure sufficient [color contrast](#) across all design elements - including text, buttons, links, and images.

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Don't rely on color alone to convey meaning.

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Use clear, logical headings (H1 for main titles, H2 for sections, etc).

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## Testing and Maintenance

Complete

Try out your site with assistive tools like the [Recite Me Toolbar](#) see how it performs with assistive technologies.

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Use an [Accessibility Checker](#) to spot any issues.

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Make sure your site looks great and works well on mobile devices too.

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Keep everything up to date to meet the latest accessibility standards and regulations.
